The History of Yeronga

Part 19

Edward Denny Day

The history of Yeronga has many people who made a difference and one such person was Edward Denny Day. Born in 1843 in Maitland, Edward's father was a police magistrate who carried out the investigation of the Myall Creek Station massacre where 28 unarmed Aboriginals were killed in cold blood by a group of 11 stockmen. Despite large public support for the killers, seven of the perpetrators were found guilty of murder and hanged. A 2016 book and a film on this horrific event is due to be released next year. I

Edward started with the Bank of New South Wales at the early age of 17, working in NSW, Victoria, New Zealand and finally Queensland. Here he switched and became part of the Royal Bank of Queensland as assistant manager when it opened in 1886, in a building designed by prominent Brisbane architect Richard Gailey, at 458-460 George St. Remarkably this building still stands

and is currently occupied by a Subway and 7-Eleven. Edward went on to become the general manager of the bank in 1898.

In 1892, he became associated with the historic Yeronga home, Avoca, since the then owner, Frederick Stewart Brown, had gone into liquidation with a substantial mortgage to the Royal Bank of Queensland. Edward and his family moved into this prestigious home, presumably to assist both Brown and the bank during the tumultuous Queensland depression of the 1890s, when many banks across Australia collapsed or suspended operations. Since 'Avoca' was now home to the well-known general manager of the Royal Bank of Queensland, it was featured in an article in Queensland Country Life in May 1902, where it was said to be one of the leading residences in the area.

As general manager of the Royal Bank, Edward developed a large circle of banking and commercial friends. He served for some years as chairman of the then Queensland Banking Association as well as president of the Chamber of Commerce and president of the Brisbane Club. It is not surprising then that Edward became involved in much of what went on in Yeronga.

Probably the most important was recorded in the Brisbane Courier of Friday 20 June 1902 when it was able to announce the arrival of the 'Yeronga Water Supply' with Edward Denny Day having been awarded the contract from the Board of Waterworks.

Another good example is the meeting he called and chaired in the Yeronga Hall (situated where the RSL now stands) on 25th March 1912 at the Yeronga Hall. He put forward the idea of establishing a bowling site and so became the first president of the Yeronga Bowling Club as a result.

The standing in which he was held is well illustrated in the attached plaque he was presented with in 1913 from the Residents and Property Owners of Yeronga District. The plaque has a picture of 'Avoca' and an illuminated address expressing appreciation for the work done for the wider Yeronga community. Mr. E. Denny Day died on 22 June 1918 at the age of 75 years.

Debra Gardiner and daughter Holly Farmer opened their ceramics studio in Yeerongpilly with a vision of building a community of people who were interested in pottery.

But they've been blown away with just how popular and well supported the workshops and classes have been since DH Makers opened their doors in February.

Part of the thriving Station Road Creative Precinct at Yeerongpilly, Holly initially thought she could manage the studio and classes herself.

Mum Debra was living and teaching pottery in Rainbow

"When we opened I didn't think I would need any help," Holly says. "Now I'm interviewing for a third teacher."

Debra has just moved back to Brisbane to become more involved with the studio.

Holly is enjoying being surrounded by other like-minded businesses in the creative hub.

"When I found this space I didn't realise just how thriving the area is," she says.



"It's a really happening creative community and it's brilliant, especially on market days when everyone has their shed doors open."

DH Makers started with one-off classes but has built up to also offer wheel throwing, hand-building and 10-week term classes.

Holly says her Mum is a fantastic hand-builder, creating beautiful vases and sculptural pieces.

She says her work is more functional ware - jugs, vases and mugs. Her love of pottery came from Mum.

"I remember being about four and going to ceramic TAFE with her. In 2017 we got more into it, becoming hobby potters and selling at markets.'

Holly sells some of her works in shops around Brisbane as well as an Adelaide store. She is currently working on an order from a Brisbane design firm for 125 latte cups.

Yeronga's leading the way in alternative pet therapies

Yeronga Vet Surgery is one of only 10 clinics in Queensland using laser therapy to treat chronic pain in cats and dogs.

Non-invasive and drug free treatments such as laser therapy are still relatively new in Australia. The machine costs between \$30 to \$60,000, clinics need a licence and staff need special training.

Yeronga Vet Surgery practice manager Zoe Kosmina says the clinic has seen some very positive results since introducing laser and cannabinoid

"Laser therapy is used to manage chronic pain, inflammation, osteoarthritis and in bost-surgery," Zoe says.

"We use laser after any surgical procedure, including desexing or dental extractions, as it really helps with healing and reduces inflammation." The animals tolerate it really well and we're seeing good

Cannabinoid therapy also serves as an alternative to synthetic or surgical treatments.

The benefits of this type of therapy for dogs and cats includes reducing stress and anxiety, treating pain and inflammation, reducing symptoms in neurological conditions and complementing oncological treatments.

Lasers can even reverse muscle atrophy and improve tendon and ligament strength and

The alternative therapies on offer at Yeronga Vet Surgery are among changes made since Dr Anita Bean sold the practice to Vet Partners in March last year.

Dr Bean still practises at the clinic, alongside head vet Dr Cheryl Macpherson and Dr Rachel

"A lot of people have been coming here for years to see Anita and it was a bit challenging at first with the change of staff and vets," Zoe says.

"Alternative therapies are definitely our main selling points, along with the fact we have a very established team.

"Anita has been here a long time and we pride ourselves on our team.'

Yeronga Vet Surgery has a fully equipped dental suite, including dental radiography.

Other services include dermatology, opthamology and nutrition advice, puppy pre-school and a hydrobath (Saturdays only)

leronga Park swimmers are making a big splash on

feronga Park Swimming Complex is the beating heart of the local community.

New parents bring their babies for lessons and kids learn to swim before eventually advancing to squads in the 25 and 50m pools. Friendships are formed – both in the pool and among the parent group.

unior swimmers train alongside world beaters, and overseeing it all is head coach Kate Sparkes.

Kate is doing amazing things at Yeronga, and on the world stage with some of the club's elite swimmers.

Open water swimmer Chelsea Gubecka secured a qualifying spot for the Paris Olympic team (the nomination still needs to be ratified) by claiming silver in the women's 10km event at the World Aquatic Championships in Japan in July.

Then, in Manchester, in August, Yeronga Park swimmers Rowan Crothers and Katja Dedekind swam so well at the World Para Swimming Championships they were named male and female swimmers of the meet.

Kate was coach of the meet. Incredibly, this is the second year in a row the Yeronga trio has claimed the top gongs.

It doesn't stop there for Kate. Just last month she was named open swim coach of the year and multi-class coach of the year by SWIM coaches and teachers Australia.

Rowan has been swimming at Yeronga since 2012, and is unbeatable over 50m in the \$10 class. For the third year in a row, he claimed the world para 50m title in Manchester. He backed up by also winning the

Katja is the newest member on the Yeronga team, moving from the Sunshine Coast after the Tokyo

The South African-born swimmer credits Kate and the Yeronga team with reigniting her passion

"Within a week of being here I was back in love with the sport," Katja says. "Kate reminds us that while we can swim fast, we're people first, and it's important to have something else outside swimming."When it's hard, she'll say go and find your love for it (swimming) again, and it helps."

The results have come for Katja too - within three months of being at Yeronga she had new PBs in her three main events – the 50m freestyle, 100m backstroke and 400m freestyle.

In Manchester, she retained the \$13 50m freestyle title, claimed silver in the 100m freestyle and took bronze in the 100m backstroke. Kate is excited by her prospects.

"We've only had Katja a short time and we see so much more potential," Kate says. "We're still teaching her how we like to do things here."

For Rowan, winner of two gold medals at the Tokyo Olympics, inspiring the next generation and breaking the 50-second barrier for the 100m freestyle keep him focused.

"I want to swim 49 seconds – no swimmer with a disability has swum under 50 seconds in a long-course pool," he says. "That's my main performance goal, but it's also about the opportunity to inspire other kids with disabilities to take up sport. "I want to encourage the next generation of kids to get involved, not necessarily to compete at an elite level, but to feel part of a community. "Discovering swimming made me happy and I found joy. I want to help other kids find that joy."
